To be eligible to apply, individuals must:

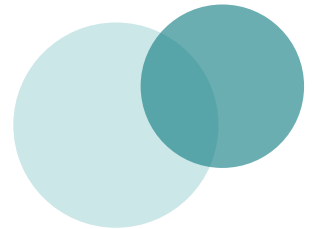
- Currently be employed and working in the Australian health sector. Note that scholarships are not available to employees of DBG Health or affiliated companies.

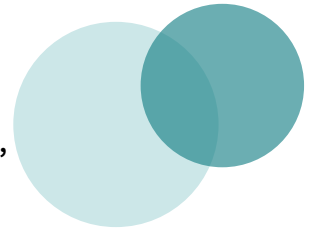
Professor Rob Moodie

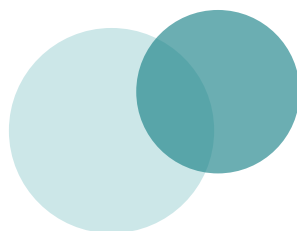

Lauren is a clinical researcher and innovation leader with nearly 20 years' experience translating ophthalmic research into real-world impact. She holds joint appointments in Optometry, Vision Sciences and Ophthalmology at the University of Melbourne, and is Deputy Director at the Centre for Eye Research Australia. A former Director of Clinical & Regulatory Affairs for a US start-up, she led global collaborations including the world-first bionic eye trial. As Associate Dean (Innovation & Enterprise), she drives translation across health disciplines. She has authored over 150 publications and was appointed a Member of the Order of Australia in 2025.

Buzz is a globally recognised leader in MedTech innovation and health entrepreneurship. With a background in orthopaedics, microsurgery, and regenerative medicine, he has supported over 1,000 startups worldwide.
